Ward Profile Introduction

About Westminster's Ward Profiles

The Ward Profiles seek to situate the unique local characteristics, as well as opportunities and challenges facing, each ward in the borough of Westminster. By harnessing the latest data available detailing a wide variety of urban issues, local pictures of each ward are drawn. To offer further context, local area (LSOA), borough and in some instances city comparisons are offered.

Given the breadth of data sets included in this document, the dates of the information used vary significantly, ranging from 2010 to November 2017.

Church Street is home to one of the highest concentrations of social housing in the borough and has been undergoing a substantial renewal programme.

At the heart of the highly ethnically diverse ward is a market with a rich history, under management of the City Council. On Church Street itself and at the eastern end of the ward trade in antiques and *bric-à-brac* has flourished since the 1960s.






In June 2016 the population of Church Street reached 13,203, which accounts for 5% of Westminster. Since 2014, there has been an increase in population of 5%.

12% of the population is 65 or older, equal to Westminster's average. 62% are between 18 and 64, less than the borough average. 26% are under 18 in Church Street, greater than the borough average.


Proportion of Population Groups, MYE ONS, 2016




Concentration of Residents, MYE ONS 2016




In 2011, English was being spoken in 50% of households in Church Street, which is equal to the Westminster average of 50%. 47% of the residents were born inside of the UK. Of the residents who were born outside of the UK, 10% have lived in the UK for 5 years or less according to the 2017 City Survey. Of those registered on the electoral role, 13% of Church Street are from the EU and 4% are from Commonwealth nations. France is the most prevalent country of origin outside Britain according to the 2017 electoratal roll.

Ethnic Diversity: Simpson's Diversity Score, ONS 2011



Simpson's Diversity Index (SDI) scores the ethnic diversity of a ward's population. The minimum value is 1 which indicates the population is made up of one ethnic group, whilst the maximum value is the total number of ethnic categories included (18 in the 2011 Census). The SDI of Church Street was 8.5, Westminster's was 4.9 and London's 2.7.

Change in Top Languages Spoken by State-School Pupils at Home, WCC 2015-17





Length of Time Living in the UK (Non-British citizens), City Survey 2017








Deprivation



Westminster's local areas are among both the most and least deprived in London according to the 2015 Index of Multiple Deprivation (IMD). This index articulates deprivation of households as an accumulation of seven discrete dimensions: Living Environment, Barriers to Housing & Services, Crime and Disorder, Income, Employment, Health & Disability and Education and Skills Training.






Benefit Claimants



In November of 2016, there were 1,745 benefit claimants of working age in Church Street (20.76% of the ward's working age population), 77% of these claimed Out-Of-Work Benefits.

Out-Of-Work Benefits Claimed, 2016 NOMIS & DWP




There are two main types of benefits which can be claimed by those out of work. Job Seekers Allowance (JSA) is claimed by residents unemployed and actively seeking work, of which there were 185. The JSA rate in Church Street was 2.2%, greater than that of Westminster's average 0.55%. Employment and Support Allowance (ESA) and Incapacity Benefit (IB), is claimed by residents with physical or mental health challenges. There were 985 ESA/IB claimants in Church Street with a rate of 11.72%, greater to that of Westminster's average 2.65%.








Income Deprivation Affecting Children Index, DCLG 2015

According to the 2011 Census, 40% of families were composed of lone parents with dependent children in Church Street. 33% of children in the ward were receiving free school meals in 2017, an indicator of the proportion of families financially stressed. Income Deprivation Affecting Children is a supplementary index within the Income Deprivation domain of the 2015 IMD measure. The adjacent map demonstrates the proportion of children in families impacted by income deprivation within local areas of Westminster's wards.

At the end of 2017, there were 458 Troubled Families in Church Street (14.4% of Westminster's Troubled Families). Troubled Families are identified based on whether they have two or more complex needs, which fall within 6 criteria: crime and anti-social behaviour, poor school attendance, children in need, worklessness or financial insecurity, domestic violence, and parents or children which suffer from health problems.







Vulnerable Older People




19% of Church Street are 65 and over, greater than Westminster's average of 18%. In 2011, 23% of this demographic group lived alone, which is less than the Westminster's average of 24%. Persons aged 85 and older make up 2% of the population in the ward.

Pension Credit is an income-related benefit made up of 2 parts - Guarantee Credit (tops up your weekly income) and Savings Credit (extra payment for people who saved some money towards their retirement). The total number of credits claimed in 2016 were 9,550, which is a 1% drop in pension credit claims in 2015.

In November 2017, there were 285 older people supported by social care services from Westminster City Council, which accounts for 18% of older people in the ward and 10% of the total over 65 social care provided by Westminster City Council.

An estimate of the proportion of persons 65 and over in Church Street likely to be excluded was calculated based on income deprivation, mobility, household and neighbourhood ties, as well as health and safety in local areas (LSOA's). Westminster's local areas were ranked according to social exclusion of older people against others in London, Church Street falls within the highest 30-40% excluded in London. Church Street is ranked within the worst 10% in London for Income Deprivation among older persons.

Persons Supported by Social Care, WCC 2017






Gross Value Added (GVA) by Ward, ONS 2015

Church Street's local economy hosts 4,160 jobs, accounting for 0.59% of the total number of jobs in Westminster.

There are 647 businesses in Church Street, which account for 1% of the total businesses in Westminster.

According to Banksearch information, there were 1,115 new start-up businesses in Church Street since 2008, accounting for 2% of the borough.

Gross Value Added is a productivity measure calculated by subtracting the cost of inputs and raw materials from the value of goods and services produced. Church Street makes up 1% of Westminster's total GVA.







Economically Active





Those classified as economically active are of working age (16-64) and either employed or currently seeking employment. In 2011, 55% of Church Street's population were economically active, of which 14% were unemployed. This was less than the average proportion of economically active (69%), and worse than the average unemployment rate (7%) in Westminster. Worklessness combines those who are actively looking for work and those who cannot work. 55% of Church Street is defined as being workless, more than the

average worklessness in Westminster (36%).

In 2017, the median income for Church Street was lower than the average median income for Westminster by £17,000. Church Street's median income was £25,800 and the average lower quartile income was £17,000. Household Income was equivalised based on household size.

Housing and Affordability




Church Street contained 4,913 residential properties in 2017, which accounted for 4% of Westminster's housing stock at the time. According to the 2011 census 25% of households were rented, 17% were owned and 56% were socially rented. In 2017, City West Homes managed 2,838 properties in the ward, of which 64% are tenants and 36% are leaseholders.

In 2017, the median property price in Church Street was £464,500 which is less than the median price in Westminster by 56%.


According to Council Tax documentation in 2017, 24 properties were listed as second homes, which represent less than 1% of households in Church Street. This is much less than the average number of second homes owned in the average Westminster ward (184). The 2011 census found there were 657 residents in this ward that had a second home elsewhere in the UK or abroad.

Net Residential Completions by Year, WCC 2017



Net Residential Completions refers to the net change in housing units built. Over the past 10 years, 61 net units were built in Church Street. This represents 0.75% of the total net change in Westminster. Due to numerous circumstances such as eligible land, the opportunity for residential development across wards varies significantly.

The 2017 City Survey found 7% of Church Street's residents reported they were struggling financially, whilst Westminster average was 5%. An area's affordability can be estimated by dividing the median house price by the median household income. This measure indicated Church Street's residents would have to pay 18 times their annual salary to afford owning a home in the ward.

Housing benefits are claimed by residents both in and out of work, who earn too little income to afford housing. In Church Street there are 593 residents who claim housing benefits, 3% of the total number of housi...




Household Composition




Of Church Street's households in 2011, the majority had 1 person in household, 47% were families, of which 56% had dependent children and 40% were lone parents, 10% were living as a couple (married, civil partnership or cohabitating) and 15% of homes were occupied by those aged 65 or over.

1% of households in Church Street were in Communal Establishments, this is less than the Westminster's average which is 3%. The occupancy rating of the ward indicates that 54% had sufficient bedrooms for their household composition, 24% were under occupying their property and 21% of the household were over-crowded.

Of Church Street residents polled in the 2017 City Survey, 4% said they were likely to move out of the ward.


Education and Schools




During their Early Years Foundation Stage (EYFS), children who achieve a good level of development (GLD) are those meeting the expected level within: communication and language; physical development; personal, social and emotional development; literacy; and mathematics. The average score of EYFS pupils in Church Street in 2017 was 57%, Westminster's average was 72%. The main Bi-Borough primary school attended by Church Street's pupils in 2017 was Gateway and secondary school was King Solomon Academy. At secondary schools, 24% of Church Street's pupils achieved GCSE grades of 9-5 (A*-C) in EBacc subjects (English, Mathematics, Science, a Language and History or Geography), which was lower than Westminster's average of 27%.

In 2017, 17% of resident primary and secondary school pupils attending a state school had Special Educational Needs, this is equal to the Westminster average of 17%.


State GCSE Scores: E&M 9-5, WCC 2017




State Attainment 8 Score, WCC 2017




State GCSE Scores: EBacc 9-5, WCC 2017




State Progress 8 Score, WCC 2017

Transport, Travel & Visitors



Accessibility to public transport is measured based on the walking time to a transport network and the service availability. Church Street's integration into the public transport network was found to be very good. An Experimental model of data from 2015 estimated that the combined day and evening population (residents at home, working population and visitors) of Church Street was 15,600, which is a 18% increase in population. The greatest proportion of residents in Church Street travelled to work by underground metro light rail tram in 2011. According to the 2017 City Survey, residents would like to travel even more by public transport.


Experimental Total Population, WCC Estimation 2017




Resident's Mode of Travel to Work, ONS 2011




Church Street

According to a 2013 study, 62% of homes in Church Street had good access to local parks, greater than the borough's average of 60%. Respondents of the 2017 City Survey suggest that 58% of Church Street used open spaces and public parks in the last three months, 29% of which were satisfied with them, less than Westminster's average of 54%.

Over the last 10 years, 10 green walls and roof planning applications have been received in Church Street. The number of planning applications received is indicative of local demand for green infrastructure but not all applications are realised.

Households with Good Access to Local Parks, GiGL 2013




Particulate Matter (PM) is a form of air pollution, a mixture of solid particles and liquid droplets in the air, most frequently emitted by road vehicles and measured in two densities, PM10 and PM2.5. Greater mortality risk, particularly from cardiovascular causes, is among the averse health effects caused by exposure to PM. Nitrogen dioxide (NO2) is another gas assessed to gauge air quality, approximately 50% of its concentration is emitted by road vehicles.

Church Street average measure of nitrogen dioxide in 2013 was 48.1µg/m3, greater than the World Health Organization's (WHO) recommended limit of 40µg/m3. Westminster's average NO2 concentration was 50.2µg/m3, above London's average of $30.6\mu g/m3$.

There were no electric vehicle charging points or bays in Church Street in 2017, less than Westminster's ward average of 9.


Of those surveyed in 2017 City Survey in Church Street 37% perceived littering to be a fairly or very big problem in their local area.



74% of Church Street reported their health condition was 'very good' or 'good' in 2011, 10% less than the borough's average response. 11% of the ward perceived their health to be 'bad' or 'very bad', 5% greater than Westminster's average.

The Well-Being Index is a score based on a combined measure of 12 well-being indicators related to health, economic security, safety, education, mobility and environment. Church Street ranks 537 of 625 London wards, indicating the probability residents experience greater well-being is among the bottom half in the city.

According to the 2011 Census, 22.7% of the ward's population were affected by long-term illness or disability, greater than Westminster's average (14%). In 2017, 100 residents in Church Street received disability benefits. There were 348 residents who received social care from the council.

In 2010, 27% of Year 6 children were classified as obese, greater than the borough average of 24%. The standardised admission ratio of alcohol-related hospital admissions in 2017 was 87, 11 more than Westminster's average. There were 3.336 ambulance attendances in Church Street in 2016, 72% of which were related to

an Illness.

Obese Children in Year 6 (%), NHS 2010









Church Street

98% of residents felt safe in Church Street and 90% felt safe after dark according to the 2017 City Survey. 15% felt that crime in their neighbourhood impacted their quality of life, this is less than the average value for Westminster (19%).

Crime rates in Westminster's wards are influenced by the influx of visitors to the borough. Between Jul 2016 - Jul 2017, 1,856 crimes were reported in Church Street, equating to a crime rate of 15 per 100 residents. This is less than the average rate in Westminster (29 per 100). Crime levels in the year ending in Jul 2017 have increased by 16% upon the previous year, whilst Westminster has seen an overall growth of 13%. According to the 2017 City Survey, 33% of the residents in Church Street perceived anti-social behaviour to be a problem in their

The London Fire Brigade responded to 305 incidents in Church Street, 7% of which were primary fires (harm people or cause damage to property) and 7% of which were secondary fires (less threatening) in 2016.



The electoral turnout for the 2014 local elections in Church Street was 35%, greater than the average turnout for wards in Westminster by 3%. The turnout rate increased by 8% for the 2016 Mayoral Electorate. During Local Elections in 2014, Church Street was held by Labour Party with a large majority vote (74%).

During the Mayoral Elections in Church Street, the large majority of 1st votes were won by the Labour Party (65%), and the 2nd votes were won by the Labour Party (27%). The election split was calculated by finding the difference between the Conservative and Labour Party votes.

According to the City Survey 2017, 87% of the community within Church Street say that people from different backgrounds get on well. 20% of the residents in Church Street spend time helping to improve the community and 26% are interested in helping more to improve community.


Service Use and Satisfaction



According to the City Survey, 83% of residents in Church Street were very or fairly satisfied with Westminster Council. Feels Safe was the amenity most valued in the local area by the residents surveyed. The most frequently used public service by respondents in the last three months was Parks & open spaces.


There are 4,550 library members registered at Church Street Library. 44% of residents in Church Street reported using library services in the last three months and 86% were satisfied with their service. 36% of residents reported they had used a leisure centre's facilities in the last three months, 88% of City Survey respondents were satisfied with them.


Residents' Satisfaction with Council, City Survey
