Response to Soho Neighbourhood Plan

Representation in response to Soho Neighbourhood Plan

As a restaurant operator within the heart of Soho, I have set out my thoughts on the Soho Neighbourhood Plan. As I understand it the plan is there to help both residents and businesses work and live together. As a whole the Plan rightly acknowledges that Soho is a unique place. The leisure and entertainment industry is the key driver for the Soho economy, which has been proven by the events of the Covid pandemic this year. There is no doubt it will take considerable time for the F&B, leisure and entertainment industry to recover. Tourism, theatres, cinema visitors, as well as office/retail workers support the character and function of Soho. Whilst there are residents who live in Soho, these residents in no way sustain the economy or character of Soho.

Whilst in principle much of the Soho Neighbourhood Plan can be supported and the polices regarding sustainability, street cleaning, refuse etc are laudable, I have focused my comments on the day to day practicalities of running a business in Soho and where the Plan can support the whole community both businesses and residents.

Soho has a late night economy – FACT. Therefore the Plan should actively support businesses that support this economy. In the current environment street trading, longer hours (whether earlier or later) should be supported. Take away service, outdoor seating and road closures should all be supported, during the day and for the evening where possible. Whilst these may be seen as emergency measures now, the Neighbourhood Plan should look to consider these practices for the future. Road closures and sustainable transport all help Soho's polices for cleaner air and reduction on dependence on the car.

Turning to specific policy:

SNP Policy 12 – Live Music Venues. "There may be locations on the edge of Soho..where larger units could effectively handle arrival and dispersal and/or later hours and may be acceptable. While wishing to support the provision of live entertainment as an important part of Soho culture and identity, this Plan wishes to prevent as far as possible the harmful impacts that continue to be identified by neighbours, police and Council.

All of Soho benefits from the late night economy, businesses feed off each other, earlier evening dining, keeps customers in the area for later entertainment venues. Management of the venues and customers should be the key to the suitability of such uses. Pushing music venues to the edges of the Soho area, undermines the unique character of the area, nor does it serve to limit late night venues across Soho, given not all of which are music venues. Shops and F&B are diversifying, increasing wet sales, introducing take away, outdoor trading and seating, or trading longer due hours to reduced covers. As a consequence Soho will change to meet the current needs of the industry. The residents that enjoy living in Soho will understand the need for this transition to sustain the character of Soho and help rebuild its economy. It is hoped the Soho NP and the City Council can set a policy framework that supports these necessary changes in the short and possibly longer term.

SNP Policy 13: Food and Beverage Developments to Protect Existing Residential Amenity

In order to be supported proposals for new A1 cafes, A3, A4, A5 and D2 uses which are in direct physical proximity to residential use must fully apply the 'agent of change' principle and demonstrate that they will not have adverse impacts on residential amenity which cannot be mitigated.

All uses should be aware and understanding of adjoining uses. Residents and entertainment /leisure industry have had a long established relationship within Soho. If residents chose to live in Soho then there should be understanding that this is in the heart of the nightlife of a major world City. New schemes should have operational management plans to ensure that the businesses do not demonstrably harm the amenity of existing residents. In the same way that new residential units or tenants within Soho should not inhibit the ability for the night time economy to operate.

Reasoned justification

While there is no clear cut-off point when the evening economy ceases, the nature of the late night economy gradually changes the area to one sometimes more based on the consumption of alcohol and illegal drugs and various forms of anti-social behaviour.

This Statement is pejorative and should be deleted. The Soho NP should be supportive of operational management plans and responsible business and landowners. Working with the business community will mitigate and help manage the impacts from the Soho economy which is reliant upon the late night entertainment and leisure industry

SNP Policy 27: Pedestrian Movement in Development Proposals

All development proposals should be designed in such a way as to facilitate pedestrian movement and prevent it being impeded by other uses such as the provision of tables and chairs.

- Proposals should seek to deliver safe, efficient and inclusive design in line with the Healthy Streets Approach and Vison Zero Strategy
- · Create clear well-lit and well signed pedestrian routes

Reasoned justification

There has been a substantial increase in the numbers of tables and chairs placed on the highway by hospitality businesses. In the light of the modal shift towards more trips on foot and the opening of the new lines referred to it is important that he use of pavements is reinforced for pedestrian priority.

In the immediate future, there will be greater reliance on street trading, outdoor table and chairs, take away due to social distancing. The City Council are actively looking at facilitating the use of the street to support the food and beverage trade. The Soho NP should be actively supporting these measures. In the longer term increased pedestrianisation of Soho Streets will support the ability for pedestrian movement and reduce conflict with outdoor trading and seating, whilst also enabling emerging access etc to be managed.

Further reasoned justification to Policy 27

The Plan expects that pedestrian use of the area will be the priority in line with London Plan and City of Westminster policies while not unduly impeding effective deliveries and collection for businesses. The objective is to see Soho become recognised by vehicle users and cyclists as a 'pedestrian priority area' particularly in the light of the intensification of pedestrian numbers.

This is supported, clear servicing and delivery strategies will support road closures and pedestrianisation of streets

SNP Policy 19 - Deliveries and Servicing

It must show in a Delivery and Servicing Plan (DSP) that on completion and once in use the adverse effects from deliveries on the immediate local environment and public realm in terms of noise, carbon emissions and pollutants have been mitigated or avoided.

Westminster City Councils commercial waste collection service operates during the night. This causes businesses to use other waste collection services to meet the servicing plans the Council requires through licensing and planning. Businesses will positively work with the Council to mitigate the impacts of waste collection, delivery and services.
